Summary: A simple claim for benefits following a workplace incident

ballooned out of control into a cascade of motions,

appearances, hearings, appeals and lawsuits attacking a slew

of court staff, public officials, lawyers, the Attorney General of Nova Scotia, and Judges with the appellant claiming damages exceeding \$500M for a variety of alleged but groundless wrongdoings said to violate Canada's criminal laws and Constitution. The respondent moved to dismiss the appellant's two appeals pursuant to CPR 90.44 on the basis that they had not been perfected; were devoid of merit; and amounted to an abuse of process.

Held:

Motion allowed. Appeals dismissed and respondent awarded costs on a solicitor-client basis.

The appellant's allegations were scandalous and absolutely unsustainable. The appellant's behaviour, words and actions would be seen by any reasonable observer to be frivolous, vexatious and a clear abuse of process. Such disgraceful and venemous language has no place in Canada's hallways of justice. The appellant's allegations against Court staff, public officials, lawyers and judges demonstrate unequivocally that he has no respect for the Court or its process. The deliberate and repeatedly reprehensible conduct of the appellant requires this Court's swift and unequivocal condemnation and entitles the respondent to its costs on a solicitor-client basis.
