Issue: Disposition/long term care of children

Summary: Three children were found to be in need of protection. At Disposition the

Minister requested permanent care and custody citing cognitive difficulties of the mother. After numerous services provided to the mother over many months expert evidence was that she did not have the ability to develop parenting skills that would allow her to care for the children on a long term basis. The children were high needs. The father

did not participate or provide a long term plan of care.

The mother's plan of care would have required the Minister to continue

with services to the end of the statutory period.

Result: Permanent care and custody order. The Court considered access but

rejected it. The Act does not contemplate the Minister providing services

indefinitely. The Court found the Respondent mother's cognitive

disabilities did not allow her to have the ability to parent the children for the long term. The statutory time limit to provide services was short and

would not provide the mother with the necessary parenting skills.
