**Summary:** The Applicant requested the Court to make a declaratory order of

paternity for a child born in Ontario. This was resorted to because the **Respondent mother had refused to provide DNA for testing under the** *MCA*. The Applicant wanted to prove paternity of the child so he could

have a relationship with her.

**Result:** The object of the *Vital Statistics Act* is to provide a record of births (etc.)

in Nova Scotia. Reference to the Province in the *Act* was the Province of Nova Scotia. There is no jurisdiction to register a child born in another province: ordering paternity testing would therefore be redundant and be contrary to the child's best interest. The application was dismissed.
