Summary: Oak Island was a participant in an emerging Canadianized silver hake

fishery, focussed in part on development of an international market for this fish. It alleges that agents of the federal Crown deliberately made false statements and initiated actions with the intention of harming it and forcing it out of the silver hake fishery, as an eventual result of which it

was compelled to declare bankruptcy.

Issues: 1. Whether the Plaintiff was eligible to participate in the 1995 developmental

silver hake fishery.

2. Whether there is any property interest in a fishing licence and/or an allocation of quota sufficient to support an action for damages.

- 3. Misfeasance and abuse of public office.
- 4. Wrongful interference with contractual relations.
- 5. Whether Defendant's activities caused or contributed to Plaintiff's losses.
- 6. Whether there is proper basis for a claim for lost profits.
- 7. Damages.

Result:

The Court found that the evidence did not support the many allegations of fact made by the plaintiff and, therefore, held that the plaintiff did not prove its claim.

The Court held that it was unnecessary to consider and decide the legal issues. Therefore, this Decision is of little value as a precedent
